Emergency Operating Levy on Ballot for May 2nd

n Tuesday, May 2nd, the district's Emergency Operating Levy will be on the ballot for voters to renew. The renewal is not a new tax. In addition, the district has not had to ask for any new operating taxes since 2009. This Emergency Operating Levy is a renewal that is presented to the community every five years. Successful passage would allow for continued collection of the Emergency Operating Levy.

"Emergency Operating tax levy is a name of a funding mechanism; it doesn't mean we are in emergency status. This tax levy is a renewal that brings in a fixed dollar amount of \$2.1 million dollars a year," explained Superintendent Scott Schmidt. "I believe the community appreciates that the board kept this levy as a renewal, allowing the community an opportunity every five years to share their support and signify we are spending appropriately. The 5-year renewal window is a great way to have additional checks and balances with the community."

The district's five-year forecast, prepared by CFO Britt Lewis, was also reviewed in-depth by the community's Finance Committee; the forecast clearly indicates that this renewal is needed to maintain current instructional offerings. Funding acquired from this zero-tax increase renewal levy will support day-to-day operations that directly

maintain students' classroom education, including teachers, textbooks, instructional programs, and educational needs.

"These are the funds we use to educate our students to make them successful," said Board Vice President Jayma Bammerlin. "It's really important." \circledast

Positivity at the Middle School

A MESSAGE FROM NORTHRIDGE MIDDLE SCHOOL

t the beginning of the 2022-2023 school year, NMS implemented Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports. PBIS is a method to teach students positive behavior strategies. We recognize that students can only meet behavior expectations if they know what the expectations are. We use common language to talk about appropriate behavior so

to talk about appropriate behavior so throughout the day students understand what's expected of them. The focus of PBIS is prevention, not punishment.

Daily, students are given tickets by any staff member when they are demonstrating

being Respectful, Accountable, and Safe or one of our Viking Values. To date, students have been recognized over 4,690 times for demonstrating desired behaviors. Monthly 3 student names from each grade are drawn from the accumulated tickets to spin the prize wheel. Students who spin the prize wheel will win items that have been donated from local businesses, gift cards or items from the PTO.

Quarterly, each teacher will nominate one student who has gone above and beyond to demonstrate being Respectful, Accountable, and Safe. A certificate will be hung on the "We are Northridge" Wall. The student and Mr. Smith will make a celebratory phone call home to share the great news. Student certificates and summary will remain posted for the year as an example of the great things being accomplished at Northridge MS. Through the first two quarters, 45 different students have been recognized.

Overall, staff and students have seen an increase of on-task behavior, a rise in grades, a decrease in missing assignments and an overall improvement of a collaborative and supportive environment. \circledast
